
Staying connected to God and each other while not meeting as church in the normal way

So, who would have thought we would be into August and still experiencing the practical restrictions that make life rather difficult and leaving us with a strange sense of unease, perhaps. We were made for community, never meant to be isolated; and so we long for the time when we can get back to meeting physically, and enjoying a fuller life-experience including worship and fellowship togther. We continue to mull over – in conjunction with the guidelines – as to what and when might be possible and practical in terms of managing a future return to some level of at least seminormal services in the church premises. For now, though, we ask for an appropriate level of patience as we watch and pray.

This week's passage is Romans chapter 15

We see, as we've already noted, that Paul was hoping to go to Spain. But the consensus is he never made it. I think we can see a similar pattern repeated in many experiences through life, our own included. Our control of future events is, of course, limited. The attitude of planning for good, though, is very much an admirable one. Martin Luther famously said, "Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree." When we pray "Your kingdom come; Your will be done: on earth as in heaven" we are saying the same thing, really – continually looking forward, and praying accordingly. Not all our hopes and dreams are met; and we do sometimes carry a sense of regret; but in Jesus, and his experience of the cross and resurrection, regret fades away; and our hopes and dreams are transformed...

Let's allow scripture – and the God behind the scriptures – to encourage us.
